Hawai'i Military Intelligence Service 1943 – 2023

The 80th anniversary commemorates the 1943 recruitment of more than 700 nisei volunteers from Hawai'i who went on to serve in the Pacific against Imperial Japan in World War II as members of the U.S. Army's Military Intelligence Service.

America's Secret Weapon

Colonel Sidney Mashbir, who commanded thousands of nisei at General Douglas MacArthur's Allied Translator and Interpreter Section, said later, "The United States of America owes a debt to these men and to their families which it can never fully repay. ... They were worthy, as individuals and as a group, of the highest praise for their invaluable contributions to the success of Allied arms."

Ultimately, nearly 6,000 Americans of Japanese ancestry would wage war against their parents' homeland in World War II, using their knowledge of the enemy's language and culture to give America a priceless edge that shortened the war and saved countless lives. From Guadalcanal and the Aleutians to Okinawa, the MIS soldiers served in every major battle and campaign of the war against Japan, gleaning vital information from prisoners and documents, flushing caves, fighting as infantrymen.

MIS intelligence specialists were among the first Americans of Japanese ancestry to see combat in World War II. They served in ones and twos, in small teams or detachments. Only the Army would enlist them, but once they proved themselves, the Navy, Marine Corps, air forces and Allied units demanded them, all over the Pacific and China-Burma-India theaters of war, as well as stateside and even Europe. After the war, they were essential in rebuilding Japan as a modern democracy and staunch U.S. ally. The MIS soldiers' feats were classified for years and they usually served on temporary duty, so their work too often went unrecorded. Yet they put to rest any doubts about the loyalty of Japanese Americans.

In 2000, thanks largely to U.S. Senator Daniel Akaka, the World War II service of the MIS nisei linguists was recognized nationally with a Presidential Unit Citation. In 2011, World War II veterans of the MIS joined those of the 100th Infantry Battalion and 442nd Regimental Combat Team to collectively receive the Congressional Gold Medal for their service to the nation.

Colonel Carol Stauffer has been commander of the U.S. Army's 500th Military Intelligence Brigade-Theater since June 2022.

Colonel Stauffer is a native of Cherokee, Oklahoma. She is an alumna of Oklahoma State University. She received her commission as a U.S. Army Military Intelligence officer in 2002. She is also a graduate of the military intelligence officer basic and captains career courses and Command and General Staff College. She holds a master's of military arts and science from the U.S. Army School of Advanced Military Studies and recently was the U.S. Army's War College Fellow at Stanford University.
